

### **MEMBER INFORMATION**

The FA has consistently urged fans to follow England in a positive way and we will continue to work hard to try to ensure a safe and enjoyable atmosphere for all supporters.

We would like to thank all England Supporters Travel Club members who have taken the time to make contact to express their disappointment and dismay at what they witnessed at the Germany v England match in Dortmund. Furthermore, the assistance from members has proved to be invaluable throughout this process.

Following the anti-social behaviour witnessed at the Germany v England match in Dortmund, we would like to make it clear that the following behaviours are not tolerated and action will be taken by Police Scotland Officers if witnessed within or surrounding Hampden Park stadium:

- Behaviour which shows support for a terrorist organisation or references atrocities associated with terrorism or war.
- Behaviour which shows hatred or ill-will towards individuals based on their religious background, race, sexual orientation or disability.
- · Any form of violence, threats or disorder.

We recognise the right to freedom of speech, whether that is through songs, chants or flags and will always encourage friendly and respectful behaviour at England matches. We are asking all ESTC members to be courteous towards the locals and opposing fans by treating them in the same way that ESTC members would like to be treated.

If you witness any xenophobic, racist, sectarian, sexist or anti-social behaviour before or during the match, you can report it in confidence by emailing **englandsupportersclub@thefa.com** or by calling or texting us on match-day on 0797 0146 250.

Members behaving in an unacceptable manner may result in:

- · Removal from the stadium
- · Suspension from the ESTC membership
- The issue of a Football Banning Order
- Report to the police and possible criminal proceedings.

Please note The FA will always investigate reports of inappropriate behaviour at an England game.

# Scottish legislation at sporting events

Travelling fans are advised that in Scotland, it is an offence:

- To be in possession of alcohol or be visibly drunk aboard a
  vehicle taking you to a sporting event. The person hiring the
  vehicle on which alcohol is being carried is also committing an
  offence. Police checks on buses and mini-buses travelling to
  this game are likely to be undertaken.
- To drink alcohol or be in possession of an open container which contains alcohol in a public place

**OUT AND ABOUT** 

From the airport there is the First Glasgow Airport Express bus service which can take you directly into Glasgow City Centre 24hrs a day. For more information, click here: **glasgowairport**




# **HAMPDEN PARK**

Hampden Park serves as the national stadium for Scotland and is the home of amateur Scottish League club Queen's Park F.C. who actually own the stadium. The stadium regularly hosts the latter stages of the Scottish Cup and Scottish League Cup competitions and has previously hosted 3 Champions League finals, a UEFA Cup final and the 2014 Commonwealth Games.

Since the redevelopment of Hampden was completed in 1999 and with further improvements made in 2014, the capacity for sporting events is now 52,063.





# **GETTING TO THE STADIUM**

### **BY TRAIN**

Hampden Park is a 10 minute walk from Kings Park Station, which as been advised by the Scottish Police to be used by English supporters. Trains for this station run from Glasgow Central. For more information, refer to National Rail timetables here: nationalrail.co.uk

### **BY BUS**

For those of you wishing to walk to the stadium, it is straightforward route form the city centre and should take approximately 45 minutes.




# **HAMPDEN PARK STADIUM REGULATIONS**

#### IT IS AN OFFENCE:

- To be in possession of any pyrotechnic devices including flares and fireworks.
- To attempt to enter the stadium with any bottles, cans or containers.
- To be visibly drunk within a stadium or its surrounding area.
- To use threatening, abusive or insulting words or behaviour to stir up racial or sectarian hatred.
- To enter the stadium without a valid match ticket.
- To bring any flags, banners or other articles that could be used as a weapon; or could cause annoyance or unnecessary obstruction.

### **STADIUM ACCESS**

The stadium entrance for our supporters will be sign-posted. The stadium will open at **3.30pm**; fans are advised to arrive at least 60 minutes before kick-off as security checks can take some time.

For security reasons, you are discouraged from bringing bags to the stadium but if it is essential, small bags will be allowed.

Flags are allowed in the stadium but there is a size limit of  $2m \times 1m$ . Members are advised that there is limited space to hang flags in the stadium, but if you wish to do so, please arrive when turnstiles open.

#### **MATCH TICKETS**

Travel Club members are advised to bring a form of photo ID with them when attending the match. As per all England away matches, tickets issued via The FA are non-transferable (to members and non-members) and cannot be used by any other supporter. Duplicate tickets will not be issued to members who have lost, stolen or damaged their ticket so please take care of your match ticket at all times.



# **TICKET COLLECTION POINTS**

Please bring either your current 2016-2018 Travel Club membership card or any up-to-date photo identification to collect your ticket.

If you are part of a group, each member must collect their ticket in person. Please be aware that all members of the group do not have to collect at the same time, but it will not be possible for another member to collect your ticket on your behalf.

To help save time when collecting tickets, we advise members to know the name of the lead booker in their order and although not essential, we would encourage members to collect their tickets as a group.

### THE HISTORY

The last time the two sides met in Scotland, Wayne Rooney led England to a famous victory in Glasgow with two second-half strikes, as the Three Lions extended their winning streak to six.

The visitors were lively from the off, and Danny Welbeck was given an early sight of goal when Rooney played him into the left side of the box. But the Arsenal man's shot was straight at keeper David Marshall and Scotland were able to clear.

Gordon Strachan's team gradually got a foot-hold in the game and were beginning to exert pressure on England's rear-guard, but failed to trouble Forster's goal. The Three Lions took the lead just after the half-hour when Oxlade-Chamberlain bagged his fourth goal in an England shirt. Jack Wilshere picked the ball up on the left and sent in an inviting cross towards his Gunners team-mate. The Ox applied the deftest of touches and it was all that was needed to take it past Marshall in goal.

A free-kick from the right was cleared only as far as Wilshere, who shot towards goal from 20 yards. The ball was deflected off target but was helped back in towards Rooney on the penalty spot and he rose, generating enough power to guide past Craig Gordon, who had only just come on.

Then with time ticking away from the home nation, Andy Robertson gave them a lifeline.

A neat one-two just inside the box, the Hull City left-back tucked away past Forster just inside the upright. It gave the Tartan Army a reason to hope for a comeback, but they were dashed almost instantly when Rooney added the third before somersaulting his way towards the England fans in the corner of Celtic Park.

- Hampden Park first hosted the Scotland v England fixture in 1906.
- At the 1937 fixture, a new world record for attendance at a football match was officially set at 149,415.
- The founder of The FA Cup and FA secretary Charles Alcock was the assistant referee in the 1872 clash between the two sides in Partick.
- The last time the two teams faced each other at Hampden Park was November 13 1999 when Paul Scholes scored twice to help secure England's qualification to Euro 2000.
- The cost of a ticket to a Scotland v England game in the 19th century was a shilling (5p).
